What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	44%	We are still achieving low percentages at the end of Year 6. This is partly because of the struggles of new children starting our school at different points, but also that our school has a culture that children rarely go swimming in their free time. Therefore, this means they only go swimming with school. This is something we are going to work on next year with parents. We also have changed next year's swimming lessons to Year 4, 5 and 6 to offer some continuity.
